

### **YACHT BRIEFING**

The chart and technical briefing take approximately one hour. All briefings are conducted on the chartered yacht and will take 40-90 minutes, depending on yacht size and crew experience

The team will give a detailed walk-through of your yacht's technical equipment, information about safe and accurate navigation, including the yacht's navigational instruments, as well as mooring, anchorage and itinerary help. The safety briefing introduces the safety equipment and your yacht's general inventory.

### **STOP OVERS**

For all DYW charters starting and/or ending in Palma, the first and last night at the marina is free of charge. Any additional nights will be charged.

### **DISEMBARKATION TIME**

To facilitate a smooth check-out process, all yachts must return to the marina no later than 5:00 PM on the day prior the official check-out. Please be aware that Fridays are particularly busy, especially at the marina's fuel station, and that each yacht is subject to both a technical inspection and an underwater check by a diver.

If you have an early departure flight on Saturday and intend to **disembark before 9:00 AM**, we kindly suggest returning to the marina earlier on Friday to ensure a smooth and stress-free departure.

Before returning the yacht, please ensure the following:

- 1. Remove all personal belongings from the boat.
- 2. Place all safety equipment neatly on the saloon table for inspection.
- All culinary items, including dishes, glassware, cutlery, and cooking utensils, must be washed and returned to their assigned positions.
- 4. **Dispose of any trash** in the designated bins ashore (ensure all garbage is *properly separated* as failure to do so may lead to penalties).
- 5. Notify the base manager or technician upon completion.

It is mandatory to leave the boat by 9:00 AM on check-out day.

The team will inspect your yacht's equipment and a general visual check of its interior and exterior. A diver will check its hull, keel, rudder(s) propeller(s) and /or bow thruster. General inspection will take approximately one hour.

### **CAR PARK**

You can find paid-for street and underground parking nearby (Parking Marquès de la Sénia).



Since the avenue is under construction, free parking is currently not available in the surrounding area, along Avda. de Gabriel Roca, Paseo Marítimo.

Please only take soft bags and not suitcases, as they would be too cumbersome onboard.

### **ACCESS BY PLANE**

Palma de Mallorca Airport (PMI): The airport is 10km from the base, which is a 13-minute journey by car/shuttle. Fly via Barcelona or Madrid, as well as other European countries, with most major airlines. There are more flights during high season. Please check the schedule on the airport website.

**ACCESS BY ROAD** 



From Palma de Mallorca Airport, head east on Carretera de l'Aeroport towards Disseminat Aeropuerto son Sant Joan for 350m. Take a slight left towards Disseminat Aeropuerto Son Sant Joan, and carry on for 500m.

Take a slight left onto Carretera de l'Aeroport/Disseminat Aeropuerto son Sant Joan and continue following Carretera de l'Aeroport for 800 m.

Keep right at the fork, follow the signs for Palma and turn onto Ma-19 for 5km. Keep left to continue on Autopista de Llevant, then Av. De Gabriel Roca and Ma-19. Continue to follow Av. De Gabriel Roca till you will see the marina at number 4.

### **ACCESS BY BUS**

From the airport, take the bus number A1Es Baluard for 30 min (stop 547). From Es Baluard (Museum of modern and contemporary art) just cross the road and walk 700 mts to your right side, along the Paseo Marítimo

# **AREA GUIDE**

### LOCAL AREA INTRODUCTION

Sailing the Balearic Islands gives you a vacation full of warm, sunny days, wonderful sandy beaches, fantastic sailing, dramatic scenery, charming ports and world-class nightlife.

Off the coast of eastern Spain, the Balearic Islands' archipelago is perfect for water sports fans, nature lovers and those seeking to relax on the beach while soaking up the sun.

The islands of Mallorca, Menorca, Ibiza and Formentera have a rich history stretching back to the ancient civilizations of Greece and Phoenicia thousands of years ago. The region is a popular yacht charter vacation spot thanks to its premier cruising ground.

Ibiza, the White Isle, is probably the most well-known thanks to its hedonist night club scene frequented by the world's most renowned DJs and celebrity circuit. Yet the western Mediterranean's Balearic Islands offer much more than its famous party atmosphere. There are plenty of quiet spots to get away from it all when sailing around Mallorca.

If you are sailing Mallorca, you will need a sailing license that is recognized by the local port authorities, or you can hire a skipper.



### TOP THINGS TO DO IN MALLORCA:

- 1. Dine and relax in Port d'Andratx: Enjoy the old time charm of Port d'Andratx, only a short sail away from our base. Grab drinks and dinner in one of the bars or restaurants along the seafront.
- 2. Stop to swim in Cala Banyalbufar on the west coast of Mallorca: This popular swimming spot isn't exactly a beach, but the water is brilliant blue and is certainly worth a visit whilst you're sailing the Balearic Islands. Dry off and continue on to Sóller, a small, elegant port surrounded by impressive scenery and an old, wooden tram that will take you to the narrow, cobbled streets of the city center.
- 3. Dock beneath the fjord-like cliffs of Porto Cristo: Porto Cristo offers great protection, plenty of berths, beautiful scenery, rich history and you can end the day enjoying dinner at one of the delicious local restaurants.
- 4. Party like a rock star in Ibiza: If you're wondering what to do in Ibiza, you'll find several well-equipped marinas, a wide range of bars, restaurants, boutiques, nightclubs and late-night fun for all ages. Or in the day, you can enjoy the beautiful beaches.
- 5. Bird watching in Cala Mondragó Natural Park: This park is a bird sanctuary and famous for its fine white sandy beaches and the unbelievable crystal-clear water. Take a dip in the waters here too. One thing is guaranteed, you really won't run out of things to do in Mallorca.

### INTERNET

Generally, the Wi-Fi in most cities and towns in Palma de Mallorca and the Balearics is good. You'll find plenty of Wi-Fi hotspots at bars, restaurants, hotels and in the marina.

### **ENVIRONMENT**

- Respect your surroundings and leave only footprints in the sand
- Only use the engine or genset when needed (fill up your tanks for the water maker at the docks when you can)
- Recycle your garbage in the correct containers at the marina
- Respect regulations around marine reserves and private islands where disembarking is not permitted



You are only allowed to sail between the Balearic Islands and not to the mainland. Night sailing is not allowed. Sailing around natural protected areas is allowed, but you must understand and respect the rules - our team will advise before you embark. Fishing is not allowed.

# **BEWARE OF POSIDONIA SEAGRASS MEADOWS!**

You are going to be sailing in areas where there are Posidonia seagrass meadows. We urge you to be extremely vigilant. These meadows form crucial underwater ecosystems in the Mediterranean, but they are fragile and threatened by a number of human activities, in particular anchoring of recreational craft.

### An underwater plant of the Mediterranean

Posidonia (*Posidonia oceanica*) is a unique marine plant that's endemic to the Mediterranean Sea. It is not a seaweed but a true flowering plant, with roots, stems, leaves and flowers. You'll recognise it by its long, green, ribbon-shaped leaves. Posidonia grows in meadows, forming vast underwater prairies. It reproduces mainly by rhizomes and sometimes by seeds.

Posidonia meadows are found in the shallow coastal waters of the Mediterranean, from a depth of 1 to around 40 metres, in clear, well-lit waters. These meadows are particularly abundant in sheltered bays where conditions of temperature, salinity and light are ideal for their growth.

Practically the whole of the Mediterranean coastline is involved here: the shores of France, Italy, Croatia, Greece, Spain, Turkey, Tunisia, and more.

### An essential ecological role

Posidonia seagrass meadows provide a habitat and a source of food for a multitude of marine species, including fish, molluscs and crustaceans. They are also ideal spawning grounds and nurseries for young fish.

Like real underwater forests, seagrass beds act as carbon sinks, helping to combat climate change: they can store up to 300 tonnes of carbon per hectare. That's 3 to 5 times more than tropical forests, and this, over hundreds of thousands of hectares. And not to mention their contribution to the production of oxygen, the protection of coasts by attenuating the impact of waves, the preservation of beaches where it accumulates in banks, etc. The loss of these meadows would have serious ecological and economic consequences for the Mediterranean.

### A protected species under threat

Despite their importance, Posidonia meadows are extremely fragile and are threatened by a number of human activities. Boat anchoring, pollution, coastal urbanisation, trawling and climate change are all factors that contribute to their degradation. Seagrass beds are particularly sensitive to anchoring by boats: anchors can uproot these plants and create almost irreparable 'scars' in Posidonia meadows, as Posidonia rhizomes grow very slowly (a rate of just 1 cm per year).



The presence of these meadows dates back between 60 and 100 million years, when terrestrial flowering plants, which resembled the rushes plant family of today, returned to the marine environment where their distant ancestors came from. Don't be the one to destroy this extraordinary heritage in a matter of minutes.

**Please note**: Posidonia has been a protected species throughout the Mediterranean since 1995 and is classed as a habitat of European interest. Ensure you are aware of the regulations in force!

As a boater, you have a key role to play in protecting Posidonia meadows.

Here are a few measures you can take to minimise your impact:

- 1. Before setting off, consult the maps that indicate the presence of Posidonia meadows. There are several free apps that can help you, such as Nav&Co or Donia. Download them.
- 2. Don't anchor in Posidonia meadows: opt for sandy bottoms or consider picking up a mooring buoy whenever possible.
- 3. Respect protected areas: some regions have marine protected areas where anchoring and other activities are regulated to protect the seagrass meadows.
- 4. In all cases, adapt your anchoring technique: to avoid scraping the seabed, you must take care to bring your anchor back up in line with the boat, even if you are on sand.
- 5. Avoid generating any pollution at sea.
- 6. Share with others: not all boaters are aware of the importance of Posidonia seagrass meadows. And set an example!

By adopting these practices, you'll be helping to preserve Posidonia seagrass meadows and the health of Mediterranean marine ecosystems. Protecting these underwater treasures is an essential and shared responsibility for future generations.









# SAILING CONDITIONS

### SAILING AREA

From our base at Marina Naviera Balear, Palma de Mallorca, you can explore nearly 300 beaches, hop between smaller islets or get close to nature on Cabrera. This island is home to Cabrera's Archipelago Maritime-Terrestrial National Park and many species of seabirds.

There's something for everyone on a Mallorca boat charter. You can also visit Mallorca's mysterious Dragon Caves and underground lake, or enjoy old Spain in the historic Port d'Alcudia.

Climb up to watch the sunset over the bay from a popular viewpoint up high at Es Verda, near Cala d'Hort, Ibiza, or sway to the Balearic beats at Cafe del Mar. Head to Formentera to relax on Playa de Ses Illetes, which has warm weather even in the spring and fall. Menorca offers gorgeous bays with Caribbean-like azure waters to explore, such as Cala Mijana and Cala Galdana.

If you love wine, you can tour the vineyards where grapes have been harvested since Roman times. Keep a look out for the native tipples of Manto Negro and Callet.

### **WEATHER**

The best time to visit Mallorca is between March to October, although the region has mild season weather all-year round. With 300 sunny days, Mallorca is known for its pleasant climate. The rainy season tends to be between October and December.

The average temperature in Mallorca in summer is about 86°F. The sea temperature in Mallorca in summer is about 79°F.

### **TEMPERATURE**

Climate in Mallorca:

Summer high: The August high is around 86°F

Winter low: The January low is 46°F

### WIND SYSTEMS

The sailing conditions in Mallorca include the Levant, which is an easterly wind that blows in the western Mediterranean and gives great sailing conditions. The region's consistent winds are one of the reasons why sailors love Mallorca.



Sailing is more challenging October to April with the risk of stronger winds. Meanwhile the sirocco, a southerly breeze in spring, and the mistral, a north-westerly in autumn, are tempered by the Gulf of Lion and bring heavy seas.
