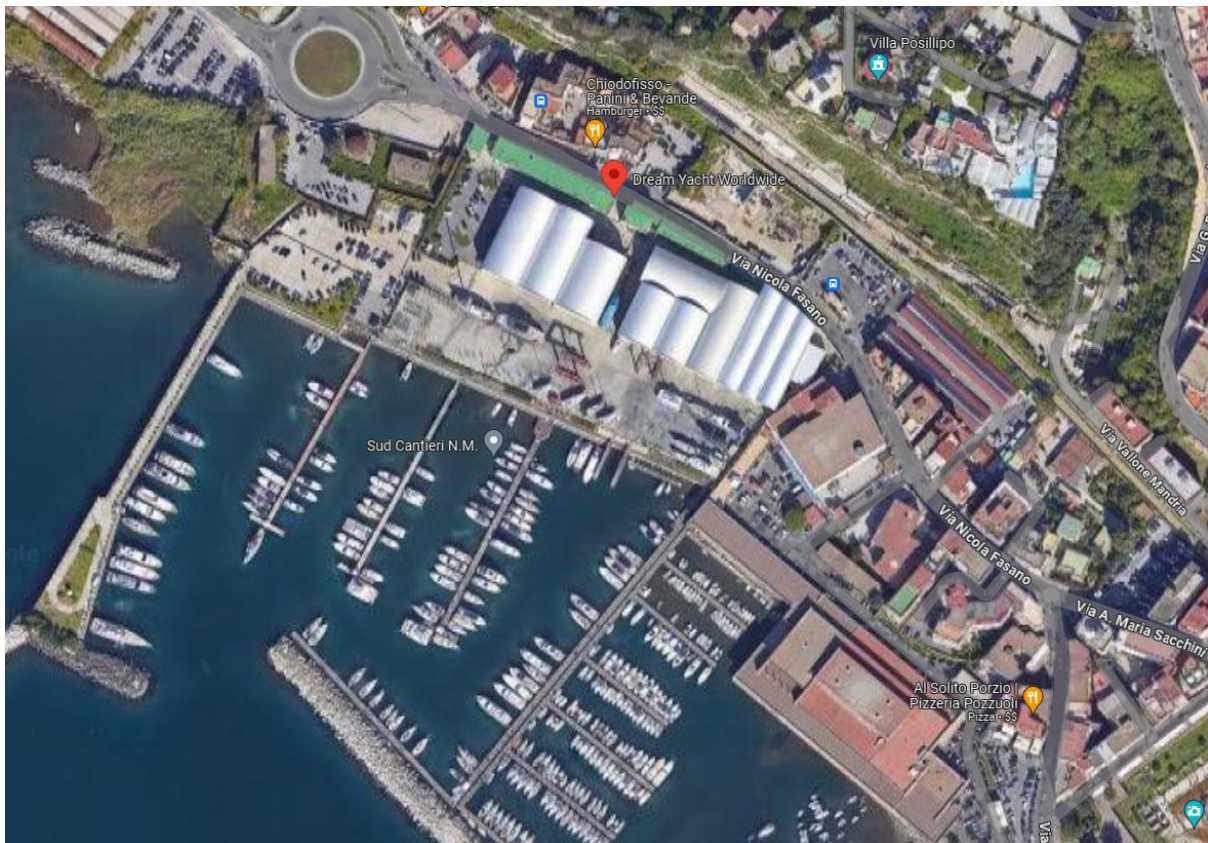

**** Effective June 1, 2024, the municipality of Pozzuoli has introduced a *tourist tax* applicable to all individuals staying overnight within the municipal area, including those accommodated on board vessels. This tax *must be paid directly to the marina*, which will forward the payment to the municipality and issue a receipt to the clients.**

Additionally, in accordance with municipal and marina regulations, copies of all passengers' passports must be submitted prior to boarding. Passengers who do not provide the required documentation in advance will not be allowed to embark.

YACHT BRIEFING

The chart and technical briefing take approximately one hour. All briefings are conducted on the chartered yacht and will take 40-90 minutes, depending on yacht size and crew experience. The team will give a detailed walk-through of your yacht's technical equipment, information about safe and accurate navigation, including the yacht's navigational instruments, as well as mooring, anchorage and itinerary help. The safety briefing introduces the safety equipment and your yacht's general inventory.

STOP OVERS

For all DYW charters starting and/or ending in Naples, the first and last night at the marina is free of charge. In different days the charterer will pay a daily rate at the marina office.

DISEMBARKATION TIME

To facilitate a smooth check-out process, all yachts must return to the marina no later **than 5:00 PM on the day prior the official check-out**. Please be aware that Fridays are particularly busy, especially at the marina's fuel station, and that each yacht is subject to both a **technical inspection** and an **underwater check by a diver**.

As there is no fuel station at the marina, please ensure the boat is refueled before returning.

If you have an early departure flight on Saturday and intend to **disembark before 9:00 AM**, we kindly suggest returning to the marina earlier on Friday to ensure a smooth and stress-free departure.

Before returning the yacht, please ensure the following:

1. **Remove all personal belongings** from the boat.
2. Place all **safety equipment neatly on the saloon table** for inspection.
3. **All culinary items**, including dishes, glassware, cutlery, and cooking utensils, **must be washed** and returned to their assigned positions.
4. **Dispose of any trash** in the designated bins ashore (ensure all garbage is **properly separated** as failure to do so may lead to penalties).
5. **Notify the base manager** or technician upon completion.



It is mandatory to leave the boat by 9:00 AM on check-out day.

The team will inspect your yacht's equipment and a general visual check of its interior and exterior. A diver will check its hull, keel, rudder(s) propeller(s) and /or bow thruster. General inspection will take approximately one hour.

BAGGAGE

Please only take soft bags and not suitcases, as they would be too cumbersome onboard.

CAR PARKING

The car park is available in the marina at the weekly rate of 70 EUR per car.

HOW TO GET THERE?

ACCESS BY PLANE

Naples International Airport: (NAP): The airport is 23km from the base, which is a 30-minute journey by car/shuttle. Direct flights from New York with United Airlines or via London, Turkey or Ireland. Please check the schedule on the [airport website](#).

ACCESS BY ROAD

If you are driving to Naples follow the signs for Tangenziale, the Naples bypass (autostrada A56) and then exit in Pozzuoli via Campana. At the first crossroad after the exit, turn right following the road signs for Marina Sud Cantieri which is about 1km away.

ACCESS BY TRAIN



You can reach the center of Pozzuoli from Naples' historical center using the *Cumana railway*, commonly referred to as *Line 4*. This commuter rail line connects *Montesanto Station* in Naples to *Torregaveta*, passing through Pozzuoli.

- **Arrival Point:** Pozzuoli Station, situated in the center of Pozzuoli.

AREA GUIDE

LOCAL AREA INTRODUCTION

Naples is known for its fascinating archaeology, immersive culture and delicious food, but this part of Italy offers something special when it comes to sailing.

The largest city in southern Italy, Naples has one of the world's largest historic centers and is famous for its UNESCO World Heritage status. A Naples yacht charter means you can sail the Tyrrhenian Sea and island hop the Pontine Islands, Phlegraean Islands, Capri and the Amalfi coast.

From Sorrento to Positano and Ischia to Ponza, the historic coastline around Naples and its islands boast abundant nature reserves, mouth-watering Mediterranean cuisine and the living history of ancient civilizations.

Naples sailing charters give you a taste of the ancient world while offering modern comforts at well-appointed marinas.

To sail Naples, you will need a sailing license that is recognized by the local port authorities, or you can hire a skipper.

TOP THINGS TO DO IN NAPLES:

1. **Explore Procida's Chiaiolella Beach:** Procida is a classic Italian fisherman's island that has been loved since the days of the Romans and Greeks. Corricella Bay is where you will find the pretty waterfront with colored houses and is a perfect place to spend a night at the anchor. Don't miss Procida's sunny Chiaiolella Beach with its shallow waters.
2. **Enjoy the thermal activity on Ischia:** Sail to Forio village on Ischia's north coast and spend the day exploring the city and swimming in Poseidon Thermal swimming pool. Head to Sant'Angelo on Ischia with its hot sandy beaches where you can see steam

rising from volcanic activity. The medieval Aragonese Castle can be reached by a causeway and is also worth a stop.

3. Visit the Roman port on Ventotene: The Pontine Island of Ventotene is famous for its Roman port and stunning natural beauty. You can also sail to the museum island of Santo Stefano and visit its prison that closed more than 70 years ago.
4. Marvel at Capri's rock formations: Capri is known for its glamorous jet set crowd, but when it comes to things to do in Capri, some may find the Faraglioni rock formations more impressive. The three towering stacks jut out of water and one has an arch that you can kayak through. Locals have names for the stacks and they are home to wildlife.
5. See the wonder of the Amalfi coast: There is so much to see, from Praiano's beaches with its Furore Fiord complete with bridge that spans across the rocks for amazing views. Make sure you sail to Sorrento and watch the sunset from Terrazza dell'Infinito, or see the colorful stacked houses in the cliffs at Positano.
6. Spend two days on Ponza: Ponza's many bays, rocks and caves make this island a fantastic itinerary stop. In particular, you will want to spend time at Chiaia di Luna bay and Frontone. You'll need two days in Ponza to include time at the uninhabited island of Palmarola.

INTERNET

Generally, the Wi-Fi in most cities and towns in the Bay of Naples is good. You'll find plenty of Wi-Fi hotspots at bars and restaurants and hotels.

- Respect your surroundings and leave no footprints in the sand
- Only use the engine or genset when needed (fill up your tanks for the water maker at the docks when you can)
- Recycle your garbage in the correct containers at the marina
- Respect regulations around marine reserves and private islands where disembarking is not permitted

REGULATIONS

There are regulations for the marine parks: **Regno di Nettuno** and **Punta Campanella** marine area - make sure you read up on them before you go.

BEWARE OF POSIDONIA SEAGRASS MEADOWS!

You are going to be sailing in areas where there are Posidonia seagrass meadows. We urge you to be extremely vigilant. These meadows form crucial underwater ecosystems in the Mediterranean, but they are fragile and threatened by a number of human activities, in particular anchoring of recreational craft.

An underwater plant of the Mediterranean

Posidonia (*Posidonia oceanica*) is a unique marine plant that's endemic to the Mediterranean Sea. It is not a seaweed but a true flowering plant, with roots, stems, leaves and flowers. You'll recognise it by its long, green, ribbon-shaped leaves. Posidonia grows in meadows, forming vast underwater prairies. It reproduces mainly by rhizomes and sometimes by seeds.

Posidonia meadows are found in the shallow coastal waters of the Mediterranean, from a depth of 1 to around 40 metres, in clear, well-lit waters. These meadows are particularly abundant in sheltered bays where conditions of temperature, salinity and light are ideal for their growth.

Practically the whole of the Mediterranean coastline is involved here: the shores of France, Italy, Croatia, Greece, Spain, Turkey, Tunisia, and more.

An essential ecological role

Posidonia seagrass meadows provide a habitat and a source of food for a multitude of marine species, including fish, molluscs and crustaceans. They are also ideal spawning grounds and nurseries for young fish.

Like real underwater forests, seagrass beds act as carbon sinks, helping to combat climate change: they can store up to 300 tonnes of carbon per hectare. That's 3 to 5 times more than tropical forests, and this, over hundreds of thousands of hectares. And not to mention their contribution to the production of oxygen, the protection of coasts by attenuating the impact of waves, the preservation of beaches where it accumulates in banks, etc. The loss of these meadows would have serious ecological and economic consequences for the Mediterranean.

A protected species under threat

Despite their importance, Posidonia meadows are extremely fragile and are threatened by a number of human activities. Boat anchoring, pollution, coastal urbanisation, trawling and climate change are all factors that contribute to their degradation. Seagrass beds are particularly sensitive to anchoring by boats: anchors can uproot these plants and create almost irreparable 'scars' in Posidonia meadows, as Posidonia rhizomes grow very slowly (a rate of just 1 cm per year).

The presence of these meadows dates back between 60 and 100 million years, when terrestrial flowering plants, which resembled the rushes plant family of today, returned to the marine environment where their distant ancestors came from. Don't be the one to destroy this extraordinary heritage in a matter of minutes.

Please note: Posidonia has been a protected species throughout the Mediterranean since 1995 and is classed as a habitat of European interest. Ensure you are aware of the regulations in force!

As a boater, you have a key role to play in protecting Posidonia meadows.

Here are a few measures you can take to minimise your impact:

1. Before setting off, consult the maps that indicate the presence of Posidonia meadows. There are several free apps that can help you, such as Nav&Co or Donia. Download them.
2. Don't anchor in Posidonia meadows: opt for sandy bottoms or consider picking up a mooring buoy whenever possible.
3. Respect protected areas: some regions have marine protected areas where anchoring and other activities are regulated to protect the seagrass meadows.
4. In all cases, adapt your anchoring technique: to avoid scraping the seabed, you must take care to bring your anchor back up in line with the boat, even if you are on sand.
5. Avoid generating any pollution at sea.
6. Share with others: not all boaters are aware of the importance of Posidonia seagrass meadows. And set an example!

By adopting these practices, you'll be helping to preserve Posidonia seagrass meadows and the health of Mediterranean marine ecosystems. Protecting these underwater treasures is an essential and shared responsibility for future generations.



SAILING CONDITIONS

SAILING AREA

Begin your Naples yacht charter from our base in Marina Sud Cantieri in Pozzuoli, a quick sail from the island of Procida with its colorful waterfront. The central location of our base makes it easy to explore the sights, sounds, smells and taste of Naples and its famous coastline.

Ashore you can climb the mighty Vesuvius and tour its smoking, volcanic crater with an impressive view out over the bay. Or, you can wander the preserved treasures at Pompeii or Herculaneum, which were consumed by the eruption of Vesuvius in 79AD.

Wherever you sail in Naples, be sure to sip an Aperol spritz and watch the sun go down, or dine on fresh seafood and authentic pasta dishes.

Naples is also known for its people that are as warm and sunny as its climate, where you can enjoy good weather between May and October.

WEATHER

The best time to for Naples sailing charters is between spring and fall. The summer months are the warmest and also the most popular time to visit. Naples has a long sailing season and you might want to consider the low season and enjoy the warmer weather and fewer crowds.

The temperature in Naples in summer averages 91°F with sea temperatures in summer as warm as 77° F.

TEMPERATURE

Climate in Naples:

- Summer high: The July high is around 86°F
- Winter low: The January low is 41°F

WIND SYSTEMS

The sailing conditions for a Naples yacht charter in the spring and summer include SE and SW winds.

Except for some small areas, such as Palmarola Island and north of Ischia, sailing is very easy without too many navigational challenges.
